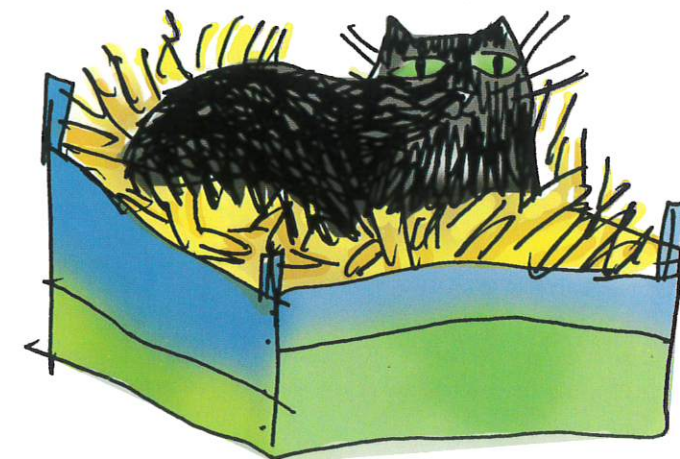
Have you got a cat? Has it ever got lost?

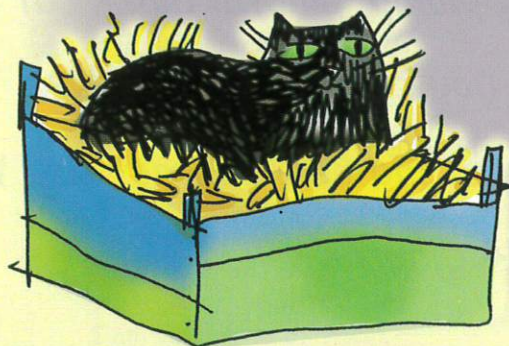

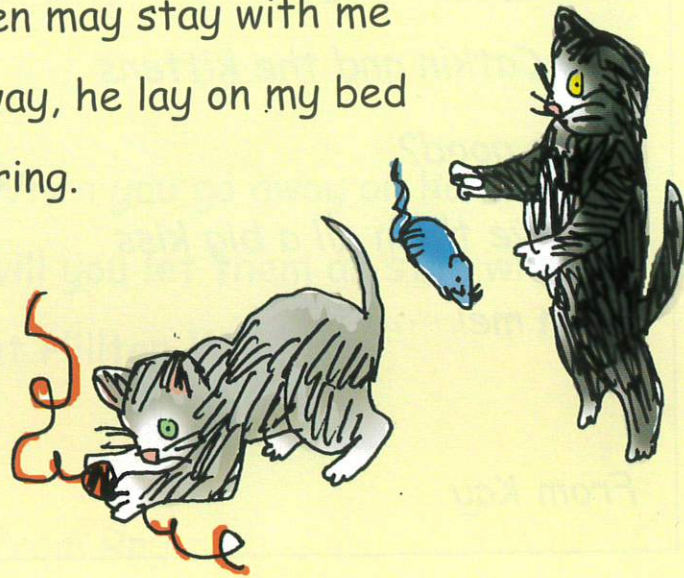
I want to ask you if the grey kitten may stay with me at Hilltop Way. When you were away, he lay on my bed all day and played with a bit of string.
